# Funding Your Kids Read Now Summer Program

**Did you know Districts can use multiple funding sources to support specific educational initiatives?**

For instance, a district could use IDEA grant money for special education students and Title I grant money to pay for Kids Read Now for the remaining students.

### Comprehensive Continuous Improvement Plan (CCIP)

CCIP is a two-part district grant application and verification system:

#### Planning Tool

Outlines district goals, strategies, action steps, and goal amounts for grants.

#### Funding Application

District budget, budget details, & nonpublic services

### Know the District

If the poverty rate is high, more grant money is usually available. If the poverty rate is low, more community money is usually available.

## FUNDING TIMELINE

<b>March-June</b>	Districts complete Needs Assessment and Planning Tool Applications
<b>May-June</b>	Districts receive allocations from State
<b>June 30<sup>th</sup></b>	Consolidated Applications due to State and this becomes the "substantially approved" date for expenditures  Prior year money must be encumbered
<b>July</b>	State approves/rejects application
<b>September 30<sup>th</sup></b>	Prior year's money must be expended
<b>December-February</b>	Carryover money from previous year becomes available

Title 1A	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Intended to help close the student achievement gap.</li> <li>• U.S. Department of Education’s largest K-12 grant program.</li> <li>• Can be used to pay for KRN in 2 different models:               <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• <b>Schoolwide Model</b> For districts with a 42% or higher poverty rate, they can use Title 1 funds to provide KRN for all students in the school.</li> <li>• <b>Targeted-Assistance Model</b> For districts with less than a 42% poverty rate, they can use Title 1 funds to provide KRN for only student show are failing (or are at risk of failing) state standards, received services under Migrant Education Program, homeless, at- tending a community day program, in an institution for neglected / delinquent children, or participated in certain federally-funded preschool programs</li> </ul> </li> </ul>
Title 3A	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Intended to improve education of Limited English Proficient (LEP) students.</li> <li>• Can be used to pay for KRN for LEP students.</li> </ul>
Title 4A	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Intended to improve student academic achievement by increasing capacity to provide well-rounded education, improve school learning conditions, and improve the use of technology to improve academic and digital literacy.</li> <li>• Has a list of special funding rules that vary based upon whether a district receives less than or greater than \$30,000 in funding</li> <li>• Can be sued to pay for KRN for all students, however this funding would likely not cover the full cost of KRN.</li> </ul>
Title 5B	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• <b>Federal:</b> Small, Rural School Achievement Program (SRSA)               <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Requires application to US DoE</li> </ul> </li> <li>• <b>State:</b> Rural and Low-Income School Program (RLIS)for Ohio               <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• No application required</li> <li>• Ohio’s money capped at \$60,000</li> </ul> </li> <li>• Districts cannot receive both federal and state Title 5B grant</li> </ul>
IDEA 6B Restoration Funds	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Intended to support services to students with disabilities.</li> <li>• Can be used if targeting preventive interventions for special education support.</li> </ul>
6B Restoration Funds	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Intended to support services to preschool students with disabilities.</li> <li>• Can be used to pay for KRN if for special education/disabled preschool students</li> </ul>
Community/Local Funds	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Rotary</li> <li>• Optimist</li> <li>• Kiwanis</li> <li>• United Way</li> <li>• Elks / Eagles / Moose lodges</li> <li>• Local foundations &amp; businesses</li> <li>• Veterans organizations</li> </ul>
